acreage: amount of land. One acre is about the size of a football field.
 agriculture: the industry of growing food and fiber; farming.
 Alaska Grown: label placed on food grown or raised in Alaska.
 bales: bundles of hay or straw; can be large and round or rectangular.
 beef: meat from cattle or cows.
 bison: also called buffalo, raised in Alaska for meat and byproducts.
 broccoli: green vegetable grown commercially in Alaska.
 cabrito: goat meat
 carrots: vegetable grown commercially in Alaska and shipped worldwide.
 conservation: wise and careful use of resources.
 dairy: milk products, or where cows are milked.
 erosion: loss of soil because of wind, water or other means.
 fertilizer: natural (manure, fish) or chemical products added to soil to help plants grow.
 forestry: use of trees, including farm woodlots.
 graze: animals, like cows and horses, feeding on grasses growing in fields.
 harvest: to collect food crops after they are mature.
 herbicides: chemicals used to combat weeds.
 horses: popular animal especially in the Matanuska-Susitna valleys and near Fairbanks.
 horticulture: growing of vegetables and fruits.
 hydroponics: growing plants without soil.
 irrigation: bringing water from elsewhere to add to fields to help crops grow.
 Kenai: one of the farming regions of Alaska.
 livestock: animals raised for food or to help on farm.
 marketing: selling products and serves.
 Matanuska: Valley with highest ag production in Alaska.
 mutton: meat of sheep; young sheep produce lamb.
 organic: grown without chemicals.
 pesticides: chemical or natural means to control insects.
 pioneer: term applied to Alaskans who came to farm in the 1940s and '50s.
 pork: meat of pigs or swine
 potatoes: largest vegetable crop in Alaska.
 reindeer: domestically raised caribou.
 seeds: planted to grow other plants; some crops, like grass and potatoes, are grown in
 Alaska to produce better seeds.
 stewardship: responsibility for the land.
 swine: pigs
 Tanana: farming area around Fairbanks and Delta Junction.
 tillage: turning over of the soil to plant crops.
 tractor: equipment used to work the land.
 windbreaks: trees planted to control wind erosion.
